# PHRASAL VERBS: USES & EXEMPLES

Definitions from Oxford Languages

## 1. MAKE UP

- 1, invent a story or plan. "she enjoyed making up tall tales"
- 2.(of parts) compose or constitute a whole."women make up 56 per cent of the student body"
- 3.compensate for something lost, missed, or deficient."I'll make up the time tomorrow"
- 4.put together or prepare something from parts or ingredients."make up the mortar to a consistency that can be moulded in the hands"

prepare a bed for use with fresh bedclothes.

PRINTING: arrange text and illustrations into pages.

5.be reconciled after a quarrel."let's kiss and make up"

#### 2. COME UP

1.(of an issue, situation, or problem) occur or present itself, especially unexpectedly."the subject has not yet come up"

(of a specified time or event) approach or draw near. "she's got exams coming up"

(of a legal case) reach the time when it is scheduled to be dealt with."it takes between one and two years before a case comes up for hearing"

2.become brighter in a specified way as a result of being polished or cleaned."I cleaned up the painting and it came up like new"

3.BRITISH: begin one's studies at a university, especially Oxford or Cambridge. "she came up to Oxford to read History"

## 3. LOOK FORWARD

Look forward to something means to be pleased or excited that it is going to happen. The 'to' in look forward to is a preposition, so we must follow it by a noun phrase or a verb in the -ing form:

I'm looking forward to the holidays.

Are you excited about your trip to South America?

Yes, I'm looking forward to it.

#### 4. CHECK IN

register someone upon their arrival at a hotel or airport."they check in the passengers"

(of a passenger) hand over baggage to the care of the airline with which they are travelling."I got a taxi to the airport and checked my bags in"

# 5. LOOK AFTER

take care of someone or something. "Meg is expected to come straight home from school and look after her younger sister"

## 6. PUT OFF

to delay or move an activity to a later time, or to stop or prevent someone from doing something: The meeting has been put off for a week. He keeps asking me out, and I keep putting him off.

### 7. FIND OUT

discover a fact or piece of information."he hadn't time to find out what was bothering her"

#### 8. PICK UP

- -> to go and get something / someone
- -> to learn something
- ex: I never pick up hitchhikers

# 9. TURN OUT

- to have a result
- to attend an event
